Message From the Principal

The month of March was a stressful and busy time for many of the faculty, staff, and administration of St. Rose Catholic School. Aside from the "normal events" of working in a school, there were added items such as Lent, uncertainty surrounding masking vs. no masking mandates, and our Western Catholic Educational Association (WCEA) Accreditation visit. I am happy to say that it is beginning to feel like some items are settling, and the focus can be more on Lent and the students.

The focus and mantra of WCEA is "continuous school improvement focused on high achievement of all students." Throughout the accreditation process, St. Rose Catholic School faculty and staff have completed a rigorous self-study of the school's programming and written an action plan based on critical goals that we have identified. Our list of critical goals was

reaffirmed by the visiting committee. During our "Action Plan Timeline" (which begins in the Fall of 2022 and ends in the Spring of 2025), we will be focusing on our three identified critical goals:

- Establish a formal rubric and assessment to ascertain student understanding and application of SLE's.
- Establish a systemic process to review and analyze a variety of assessment data in order to effectively differentiate instruction.
- Create and implement a comprehensive professional development plan for teachers to address the varying learning and social-emotional needs of students.

I look forward to the opportunity to tackle our goals and improve upon an already outstanding experience at St. Rose Catholic School.

I also value the feedback from the primary educators of our children, the parents of St. Rose Catholic School. Each Spring, I send out a Parent Satisfaction Survey. I do this not just to "check off a box" and pretend that I am listening but gathering authentic feedback from you to inform future decision-making. While there was plenty of positive feedback on the 2020 - 2021 Parent Satisfaction Survey, there were so stakeholder identified areas to look into. As usual, we took the five areas that seemed to occur most often and looked into how we could begin to address them (if reasonable and in the school's mission). The top focus points from last year's survey were:

- 1. Spanish program: have a teacher in the classroom who can teach the subject and use Rosetta Stone as a supplement.
- 2. Playground: repair or replacement of the current blacktop.
- 3. Recess: additional supervision on the playground during elementary school recess.
- 4. Extra-Curricular opportunities: bring back after school athletics and clubs.
- 5. Communication: improvement in quality and quantity of communication from classroom teachers to parents.



26th Annual St. Rose Catholic School Dinner Auction: Thank you to all who supported our 26th Annual Dinner Auction! We appreciate all involved, from those who put the event together to those who purchase tickets to support the school. While a virtual auction is not the "ideal" it went very well, and I know many families made the best out of an unusual situation. I am thrilled to announce a net profit of roughly \$195,000.00 from the auction! If we include "Principal's Fund" donations before the event, that number jumps to approximately \$209,000.00 net. This is an incredible number for any auction, particularly where there was no actual "event" to attend. I can only chalk this up to the work of the amazing team of organizers and volunteers who put the auction together and the generosity of the St. Rose Catholic School community and friends of St. Rose Catholic School. Thank you to everyone who made this possible!

Principal for the Day: On Wednesday, March 23, I was able to take a step back from my duties and host Piper and Phoebe Bonelli as "Co-Principals of the Day". 




Helping Families with Social Media Flowchart

Kids: Take a deep breath, tell an adult you trust that something happened and you need their help. Work through this flowchart together.

Parents/Adults: Acknowledge this is difficult and encourage your child to be COMPLETELY honest about what happened. Thank them for being brave enough to discuss the situation and ask for help.





Parents/Adults: You have the right to set boundaries around technology and this is proven to help kids thrive in the online world. Create a contract and discuss expectations for online and in-real-life behavior. Put consequences in place and follow through with them to manage the space and create accountability. If children behave poorly online, it doesn't mean you're a bad parent. Sure, we feel bad about it, but it doesn't mean WE are bad and our kids aren't bad either. Kids make poor choices and behave negatively online and in real life. We ALL do. Use the situation as an opportunity to learn together and guide children to appropriate behaviors.

<u>Kids:</u> Social Media and technology are tools to help you navigate in the real world and be connected with others. Use it as if whatever you say or do in the online world will be tattooed on yourself for the rest of your life, because it will be. Content doesn't get deleted, it just gets stored away where people can't see it quickly. Even if the content can' be retrieved easily, people don't forget what's happened. Your parents love you and want you to be safe. Boundaries are put in place for you so you can thrive and develop into outstanding, responsible adults.

Parenting Kids on Social Media



Things You Can Do RIGHT NOW to Parent Your Kids on Social Media (even if you aren't on social media yet)

- Model and/or expect polite cell phone use -Keep cell phones away from
 the dinner table * NEVER USE IT WHEN DRIVING * put your phone down
 when you talk with someone * don't accept calls or texts when talking with
 someone * create other boundaries for your family
- Move cell phone chargers to a public space so cell phones "go to sleep" at a certain time -Teens (adolescents) need uninterrupted, "unplugged" sleep -and adults do, too!
- Find a way to connect with your child about media -Surf through their Instagram stream together * watch funny youtube videos together * listen to an entertaining podcast together * look at an intriguing board on pinterest together
- If your child is new to social media, know their passwords on their accounts –You may not know how snapchat works, but if your child knows you can tune in at any time, this increases their accountability. This creates "training wheels" as your child begins their exploration into the Social Media world.
- If your child is on social media already, know what platforms they use
 Just knowing where your child is walking on Social Media creates accountability.
- Talk with your child about ways they see Social Media being used for good –Kids see positivity and connection on Social Media all the time. Ask them who they helped today on Social Media or who they saw do something kind in a virtual way.
- <u>Talk with your child about ways they see people behaving badly on</u>
 <u>Social Media</u> -Talking about negative behavior offers opportunities to discuss what could be done differently. Looking at why someone may behave a certain way creates empathy.



Questions to Start a Conversation About Social Media with your Kids

- 1. What do you think are the three (two?) best social media platforms? Why?
- 2. What would you do if a conversation got ugly on social media?
- 3. Do you think a social media account should be private? Why or why not?
- 4. Have you ever seen anyone get cyberbullied? What did you do? What did others do?
- 5. How many of your friends are on social media? What are the popular platforms you use?
- 6. What do you know about a digital footprint?
- 7. You know you're not supposed to talk to strangers in real life –what about strangers online?
- 8. What rules have you made for yourself about how to behave online? Do you follow them?!?
- 9. What would you change about social media if you could?
- 10. What makes you laugh when you're on social media?







Signs of possible cyberbullying

(If they aren't being cyberbullied maybe something else is going on)

- 1. Hesitant to be online or unexpectedly stops or avoids using the computer
- 2. Nervous when an Instant Message, text or Email appears (watch your child's response)
- 3. Visibly upset, angry, or depressed after using the computer or cell phone
- 4. Hides or clears the computer screen or cell when you enter or doesn't want to talk about online activity
- 5. Starts using the computer when you're not in the room (a change in pattern)
- 6. Keeps going back and forth to check screen in shorter spurts
- 7. Withdraws from friends, wants to avoid school or peer activities or uneasy about going outside in general, pulls away from family members
- 8. Suddenly sullen, evasive withdrawn, marked change in personality or behavior
- 9. Trouble sleeping, loss of appetite, excessively moody or crying, seems depressed
- 10. Suspicious phone calls, e-mails and packages arrive at your home
- 11. Possible drop in academic performance or falls behind in schoolwork

The key is to look for a pattern in your child. You should not overlook a sudden change that is not your child's "normal" behavior that lasts at least every day for two weeks. But even then, trust your instincts. If you are concerned, don't wait. Talk to them and get help!
