Message from the Principal

As we enter into the second quarter of the 2020 - 2021 school year, we are happy to welcome back our 7th and 8th-grade students to in-person instruction. In California, students from 7th grade and above were unable to resume in-person instruction unless the county that the school

resides in had been placed in the Red Tier (school waivers were only valid in grades K - 6). While it was possible that our 7th and 8th-graders could come back on October 13, we decided to bring them back for the first day of the second quarter not to disrupt the Quarter One assessment process. Moving forward, now that we have our student body back on campus, I want to do everything possible to keep it this way. There are potentially some scenarios that the entire school may have to revert to distance learning:

- 25% of all schools in the Paso Robles District must close their doors to in-person instruction as mandated by the San Luis Obispo County Office of Public Health.
- 5% of the student and staff population of St. Rose Catholic School tests positive for COVID 19.
- The county of San Luis Obispo hits twice the metrics for being in the Red Tier, *and* our public health officer requires shutting down of schools.
- I feel that I cannot maintain my faculty and student population's safety to the best of our abilities.

With the cold and flu season on the horizon, I am asking everyone to be as diligent as possible and always err on the side of caution. **On Tuesday, October 27, all principals in the Diocese of Monterey received an updated directive on Diocesan health and safety protocols related to COVID 19.** These directives follow and have been adopted from the <u>CDC</u> and <u>California Department of Public Health Framework for K - 12 Schools</u> and have been written in an 8 page "If This, Then That" flowchart for schools. I will do my best to condense this into a short narrative for you and you may print out a bulleted list at the end of this document:

- 1. If a student exhibits <u>COVID 19 symptoms</u> and is not identified as a <u>close contact</u> to a positive case:
 - a. The student will be isolated and sent home, testing will be recommended, and the class and school will remain open.
 - i. **Note:** Siblings are not required to be sent home until/unless the sick student has a confirmed case of COVID 19 OR the siblings are also symptomatic.
 - b. Student can return to school when they have been 24 hours fever free without the help of medication, symptoms have improved, AND ten days have passed since the onset of symptoms, OR if no test is taken, the student may return with a doctor's note that cites a non-infectious diagnosis (example: asthma, allergies, migraines, etc.)
 - If the student is tested and confirmed to have COVID 19, the student can return to class after 10-day isolation from the onset of symptoms per public health*. <u>Cohort</u>/close contacts can return to school 14-days after last known exposure if children do not experience any COVID 19 symptoms per public health.
 - ii. If the student is tested, and COVID 19 results come back negative, the student can return to class after they have been fever-free without the help of medication, had an improvement of symptoms, and have no known contact with a COVID 19 positive case.
 - a. *If a positive case of COVID 19 is reported, Public Health will be notified for guidance.

2. If a student is identified as a close contact of a confirmed case of COVID 19:

- a. The student will be isolated and sent home, testing will be recommended, and class and school will remain open. Public Health will be called to confirm the quarantine protocol for the student and cohort.
 - i. The student will be required to have a 14-day self-quarantine from the last known exposure to COVID 19 positive case.
 - a. **Note:** a negative COVID 19 test will not shorten the required 14-day self-quarantine.

3. If a student is confirmed to have COVID 19:

- a. The student will be able to return to school after 10-day isolation from the onset of symptoms per public health, the student is fever free for 24 hours without the aid of fever-reducing medication, and symptoms have improved.
- b. The cohort and close contacts will most likely (pending guidance from public health) have to self-quarantine for 14-days per public health. The cohort and close contacts may return to school 14-days after the last known exposure, as long as the child does not experience any COVID 19 symptoms.

School cleaning protocols will continue to follow along with those stated in our 2020 - 2021 School Operations Plan. If you haven't already done so, please consider getting your child vaccinated against the flu this year to help avoid having to wind your way through all of these protocols.

In accordance with the health and safety theme of this section, I wanted to briefly discuss protocols for travel with the Holiday Season almost upon us. Many of you have recently asked about out of state or international travel and what the protocols are.

- Out of state travel: California does not have a mandatory quarantine for travelers coming from out of state or returning to California. As a school, we will be following CDPH guidelines on this. Please feel free to return to school upon traveling out of state; however, if you suspect that your children may have been in contact with anyone with COVID 19, or is exhibiting any symptoms, your child will follow the protocol listed above. Please be especially cautious and take into consideration postponing travel to "COVID hot spots" in the United States.
- International travel: As of late August 2020, the CDC dropped their quarantine guidance upon return to the U.S. for American citizens traveling internationally. This includes travel to those countries that are designated as "Level 3 High Risk". For information on foreign travel, please refer to the CDC Travel Notice Map. Upon return to the United States, please refer to the CDC's After You Travel page for recommendations. From a school perspective, I am asking that everyone do their part and be as safe and careful as possible whenever and wherever you travel. There are areas in the United States that are considered "COVID hot spots" with higher case rates than many international destinations. Simply put, be safe, be careful. If you have any inclination that you or your family has been exposed to COVID or are experiencing ANY symptoms, plan to stay home for a 14 day quarantine period.

Updates/New Items

School Uniforms: School store orders should be in the office on or before Friday, November 13. We will be changing the opening dates on the school store to open for one week every month. If you missed your chance to order on the past "opening," please note that the store will open again on Monday, November 2, and close on Friday, November 6. Once the store closes, delivery to the school is estimated at two weeks from store closing. Please see the school calendar for future opening dates (roughly the first week of every month). As a reminder, after Thanksgiving recess, all students will be expected to wear school clothing per our 2020 - 2021 Family Handbook pages 25 - 27.

Extended Care: Extended care, re-opened on Monday, October 19. Once again, it will be limited to 18 students per day, and our hours will be adjusted to run from 3:00 - 5:00 as additional cleaning time will be required and will run from 5:00 - 5:30. To sign your children up for October 19 - November 30, please click here. So far, our numbers have been extremely low as we have yet to have more than one student in a day. By the end of November, I will need to decide whether we can continue running the program due to low numbers. If you plan on utilizing extended care this year, please take this four question survey by November 13 to help in my planning.

New Middle School Chromebooks: Our 7th and 8th-grade students were welcomed back to in-person instruction with new Chromebooks. All 18 of our grade students received a new device for their one to one usage for the 2020 - 2021 school year compliments of a very generous donation from the local <u>Italian Catholic Federation</u> Branch 354. The Italian Catholic Federation has a long-standing tradition of working with St. Rose Catholic School to support our programs and scholarships for our graduating 8th-grade students. 

Middle School ELA: I would like to take this opportunity to share a letter to you from Ms. Davis, who teaches our 6 - 8th grade English and Language Arts. Ms. Davis has very high expectations for her students, and the results are impressive!

What have the Middle School Students been doing during the first quarter in Language Arts & Literature?

In Nine weeks, with most still distance learning:

- 1. They have completed over 25,000 IXL grammar, reading, and writing questions.
- 2. Completed eight units of spelling and grammar using Wordly Wise's online program.
- 3. Each class has completed a novel study: The Hundred Dresses (6), The Outsiders (7), and Farewell to Manzanar (8).
- 4. All three classes have completed at least one essay from outline, to editing, to final draft on topics ranging from comparing and contrasting life in an internment camp and during our pandemic to following a character's development throughout a novel. Sixth Grade has completed its first research report on a Saint of their choosing.
- 5. Each class read suspenseful short stories as a foreshadowing of their own suspense story in the writing process at this point.
- 6. Plotlines and plot studies have also been completed during this quarter.
- 7. Grammar work has been done using the 2020 Manual and workbook. They have each completed over 20 pages to date.
- 8. They have used online video lessons from Google's Applied Digital Arts to improve their skills using Google draw & slides to create posters and slide shows and brainstorm various topics using Jamboard.
- 9. These hard-working students have taken over 150 Accelerated Reading quizzes on novels, 400 Nonfiction article quizzes, and read over 8,500,000 words in the first quarter alone.

Keep up the great work, middle school students, and Ms. Davis!



• **Kindergarten:** What a dynamic class. I cannot help but laugh when I think back to the morning that I walked into the classroom, and it was, well, pretty much mayhem. About 30 minutes later, I get a video message showing every one of her children sitting and engaged in a learning activity. What a turn around!




• **First Grade:** I don't know if two days have gone by this year, where a first grader hasn't stopped by to show me where they lost another tooth! I don't know what Ms. Clipperton is doing in class, but the teeth are falling out left and right. I've asked the kiddos what the Tooth Fairy pays these days, and I must say, inflation must have gone up as that Tooth Fairy pays much better than when I was in first grade.





- Second Grade: I think back to my first real experience with this class when they were in Kindergarten. At that time, this was a much more heavy "boy" class than it is now, and I was pretty sure that Wrestlemania was going to break out on the yard with these guys every day. I look at them now and see that the girls have put up well with the "rough" boys in the class, and the boys have "figured it out" and have come quite a long way. - Fourth Grade: This school year's theme has been adding girls to Ms. Glunz's fourth-grade class. What was once a class of more boys has flipped to a class or more girls. This class has been so welcoming to the five new girls that we have welcomed into the class since the start of in-person learning. I also have to say that this is my "friendly banter" class as some die-hard Broncos fans (including myself) and some die-hard Raiders fans in this class. Ouick Glance Illness Protocol COVID 19

- 1. If a student exhibits COVID 19 symptoms and is not identified as a close contact to a positive case:
 - a The student will be
 - i. isolated and sent home
 - ii. testing will be recommended
 - iii. the class and school will remain open.
 - a. **Note:** Siblings are not required to be sent home until/unless the sick student has a confirmed case of COVID 19 OR the siblings are also symptomatic.
 - b. Student can return to school (in the absence of COVID testing) when
 - i. they have been 24 hours fever free without the help of medication
 - ii. AND symptoms have improved
 - iii. AND ten days have passed since the onset of symptoms
 - iv. OR if a child obtains a doctor's note that cites a non-infectious diagnosis (example: asthma, allergies, migraines, etc.)

If the student is tested and confirmed to have COVID 19 the student can return to class

- v. after ten day isolation from onset of symptoms per public health
- vi. Cohort/close contacts can return to school 14-days after last known exposure if children do not experience any COVID 19 symptoms per public health.

If the student is tested, and COVID 19 results come back negative, the student can return to class

- vii. after they have been fever-free without the help of medication for 24 hrs viii. symptoms have improved
- ix. have had no known contact with a COVID 19 positive case
 - a. **Note:** If a positive case of COVID 19 is reported, Public Health will be notified for guidance.

2. If a student is identified as a close contact of a confirmed case of COVID 19:

- a The student will be
 - i. isolated and sent home
 - ii. testing will be recommended
 - iii. the class and school will remain open.

- a. **Note:** Public Health will be called to confirm the quarantine protocol for the student and cohort.
- iv. the student will be required to have a 14-day self-quarantine from the last known exposure to COVID 19 positive case.
 - a. **Note:** a negative COVID 19 test will not shorten the required 14-day self-quarantine.

3. If a student is confirmed to have COVID 19:

- a. The student will be able to return to school
 - i. after 10-day isolation from the onset of symptoms per public health
 - ii. AND the student is fever free for 24 hours without the aid of fever-reducing medication
 - iii. AND symptoms have improved.
 - a. **Note:** The cohort and close contacts will most likely (pending guidance from public health) have to self-quarantine for 14-days per public health. The cohort and close contacts may return to school 14-days after the last known exposure, as long as the child does not experience any COVID 19 symptoms.

Dear Diocese of Monterey Catholic School Community,

On the Feast of All Souls Day today, my prayers are with you as we remember those in our lives who have gone before us. May we honor their memories and find comfort in knowing they are in heaven with our Lord.

I'm writing to you today to provide a Diocesan update, to share my continued gratitude and to highlight our health and safety protocols.

Diocesan Update

The Diocese of Monterey includes the four counties of Monterey, San Benito, San Luis Obispo and Santa Cruz. Each week, the California Department of Public Health assigns each county a Risk Level on a four-tier scale, which determines the county's re-opening activities. As it relates to schools, all our preschools have been open since the summer, and grades TK-12 are in different phases of returning to in-person learning depending on the county.

• Monterey County - Tier 1: Purple/Widespread

- Preschools open
- o Waivers approved for grades TK-6, returning in November

• San Benito County – Tier 2: Red/Substantial

- Preschool open
- o Waiver approved for grades K-6, returned in October
- o Grades 7-8 returning in November

• San Luis Obispo County – Tier 2: Red/Substantial

- Preschools open
- o Waiver approved for grades TK-6, returned in September
- o Grades 7-8 returned in October
- o Grades 9-12 phased return began in October

• Santa Cruz County – Tier 3: Orange/Moderate

- o Preschools open
- o Grades TK-12 returned in September

I would like to commend and to extend my appreciation to our principals, administrators, teachers and staff for their incredible efforts in providing a robust distance learning program and in transitioning to an engaging in-person program. The demands on our educators are many, and the

nurturing environment they provide our students is unmatched. I am humbled by their service to the Catholic schools in our Diocese and am grateful for their ministry.

I would also like to extend my appreciation to our Catholic school parents and families for having faith in our schools. Choosing a Catholic education comes with many sacrifices for a family, and I am grateful for the continued partnership.

Health and Safety Protocols

Our schools are doing a great job in consistently implementing the health and safety protocols outlined in our operations plans. Thank you for supporting these protocols, which include daily symptom screenings, wearing masks, social distancing, proper hand hygiene, cleaning and disinfecting, and illness management. As you know, these plans are based on the guidelines provided by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the California Department of Public Health and the school's County Public Health Office. As more is known about the novel coronavirus SARS-CoV-2 and it's related disease COVID-19, guidelines are frequently updated, which leads to multiple revisions to schools' operations plans.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the California Department of Public Health have provided guidance for travel and for upcoming holiday celebrations. Depending on the school's operations plan, families may need to participate in the school's remote learning option following travel to ensure the health and safety of students and staff. Please check with your school's principal regarding specific school policies. Thank you for your support and cooperation.

Prayers

When the initial shelter-in-place orders were announced in March, it was hard to imagine that Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year's would be affected.
