Message From the Principal

I pray that everyone's school year has started positively and joyfully. I have made it a priority for myself to be present in the classrooms more this year than I was last year. I was able to be in all classrooms multiple times throughout the first two weeks of this school year. I know that you, as parents, are not in a classroom daily (although we do love to have you as a classroom volunteer), and I wanted to give you a quick glimpse of some things that I have seen over the first ten days of school:

- Preschool: A group of boys and girls playing in the sandbox. One child asked if he could
 play with another child's toy; the other child said, "here", gave him the toy, and found
 another toy for him to play with. They continued playing happily.
- Kindergarten: These ones can be active. I watched the entire group "go on a bear hunt" according to their movement video. Little ones can only sit long before needing a body and movement break!
- First grade: What started as a behavior issue became an entire class discussion on how we play, who we can play with, and how to resolve differences. I was amazed at how frank and well-thought-out a few of the answers I received were.
- Second grade: A class full of kids who want to volunteer. Watching Ms. Choboter's interactions with the kids and their interest levels, I was amazed at how many children wanted to volunteer to answer questions.
- Third grade: Unbeknownst to me, we have some actors and actresses in this class. I could see the script of some of the students' play that they wrote. When asked if it was for the talent show in the Spring, I was told that it was just for fun!
- Fourth grade: I observed 4th grade for some time during their P.E. class. Other than the action of the game they were playing, I noticed the care that some of these students have for their classmates. One student ran into another student and went down; instantly, a few other students went to check on the downed student. This care helped him get up quickly and back into the game.
- Fifth grade: I watched Ms. Garcin greet her children at the door. It seems that each child is already showing their rapport with Ms. Garcin in various ways; whether it be a hug at the door, knuckles, or a simple "hello," they are all actively pursuing a respectful beginning to the day.
- Sixth grade: Welcome to middle school! The first quarter can be overwhelming for 6th graders; fortunately, this group seems eager to ask questions and understand their expectations. The students asked plenty of well-thought-out questions at our middle school student orientation.
- Seventh grade: A full year into middle school, this class has fully gotten down the routine and order. Yesterday, we started talking about Yosemite, as they are the first middle school class this year to go on an overnight field trip. It's hard to believe they'll be headed off to Yosemite Valley on September 25 29.
- Eighth grade: This group is itching to get to high school. I was already asked on week one what we will do on the 8th-grade field trip, how many days it will be, and who can I room. with at the hotel! For context, the 8th grade trip is usually taken around week 36 in mid-May. I'm glad they are excited, but there is plenty to learn in the interim.

New Items/Upcoming Events

Stampede to Race and Read: Be on the lookout for information coming home on our annual Stampede to Race and Read, which will kick off on Tuesday, September 5. We request that all 6th-grade parents attend the Parent Orientation and invite all 7th and 8th-grade parents to attend.


School Masses: As previously stated, school Mass will now be held on select Wednesdays throughout the year beginning at 10:00. These Masses will only be open to the student body and their families. The only door to be unlocked during these Masses is the door that leads directly out to the school. If families would like to attend, you must access the church via the school using your keycard at the front gate. I ask that all family members who leave before Mass is over exit again through the school to make sure the front door of the church is accidentally not closed all of the way. Please see our school calendar for school Mass dates.

FACTS Tuition Management: This is not really a "new item," but I want to clarify something about the management system. For billing, most families select an automatic withdrawal method (most from a checking account to avoid credit card fees) for tuition and fees. However, "incidental expenses" will come up occasionally throughout the year, and many families have not set up these charges to come out automatically. What are incidental charges? These are charges that are not tuition or fees, such as billing for field trips, participation in extracurricular athletics, opt-out fees, etc. Frequently, I find myself reaching out to families to settle up on their incidental expenses, and I usually get, "but our account is set up for autopay." That is correct; most have it set this way for tuition and fees but not incidentals. Next time you log onto FACTS, double-check this.

Help for Maui/Lahaina: For those who have been to Hawaii, particularly Lahaina, you know it is a beautiful place with a vibrant culture. Most of us know that the town of Lahaina was destroyed by a devastating fire in early August. Some of you have reached out asking about how to help. If you are interested in helping, please see the end of this newsletter for a letter from the Diocese of Monterey Bishop Danny Garcia, which provides information on how to help the people of Maui.

Extended Care: Extended care is for grades K - 8 and is limited to 25 children per day. We request that you preregister for extended care on our website. Go to our website, click the "pancake" or "hamburger", click extended care and sign up. We had hoped to hold extended care in room 7 this year but have found that the middle school setup could be better for younger children. Effective 8/28, we have moved the extended care home base back out to the 3rd-grade classroom (farthest portable from the school). I am currently working on a long-term solution for where the best spot on campus is to hold extended care.

Parent Alert: This year we have started using a "Parent Alert" through FACTS Management Company. Alerts will be sent via text message to the primary caregivers of the students in the event of an emergency or an urgent school-wide communication. The message will display on your phone as "SRS ALERT" and the message will follow this title. These alerts will only be used for what I deem as urgent matters.

Old Items/Reminders

PTO General Meetings: What is the PTO, you might ask? How do I get involved with the PTO? I hear these questions occasionally, and I'll do my best to answer some of these questions right now.

The PTO (Parent Teacher Organization) is an independent organization for parents and teachers with its operating budget. The PTO aims to benefit the education and development of all students and staff, foster communication with families, and host community-oriented events. Did you Know?

You may have noticed that we have a "Pet Blessing" scheduled on our calendar for Monday, October 2, at 8:00. Some may wonder what this event is.

The Pet Blessing is traditionally held on the feast day of St. Francis of Assisi. St. Francis was born in the 12th century in Italy and is remembered for his generosity to people experiencing poverty, his willingness to minister to lepers, and his love of animals and nature. St. Francis is the Catholic church's patron saint of animals and the environment.

While the feast day of St. Francis is on Wednesday, October 4, we will celebrate the Pet Blessing on Monday at our flagpole ceremony beginning at 8:00. Children and parents may bring their pets to school to be blessed at our blessing ceremony. All animals must go home with their adult parents immediately after the end of the ceremony at roughly 8:30. Children who cannot bring their pets may get a photograph of their pet to be blessed. **A few ground rules:**

- Dogs must be on a leash at all times.
- "Accidents" must be picked up promptly.
- Cats and other small animals should be in a cage or box. Please be aware that there are usually a lot of dogs around, and sometimes cats are not too happy about this.
- All animals go home with their adult parents immediately after the ceremony.
- Please refrain from bringing farm animals (those with hooves).
